We understand that majority of people are tired of hearing about Covid-19, but we just want to remind everyone that Covid-19 is still here within our community. Although masking is not mandatory now in M'Chigeeng we strongly recommend that you wear a mask when you are in any close settings such as an office or public gathering, stay home if you are sick and continue to wash your hands.

Besides covid it is flu season, and we are seeing a very high number of flu cases within the community so please take the same precautions of covid to reduce the spread of the flu. We have plenty of flu vaccines available at the health centre so please call to make an appointment to get you flu vaccine.

The nursing department has been very busy with Covid-19 and flu vaccine clinics, doctor clinics, diabetes awareness program and prevention programs. Homecare continues to provide PSW (continued on page 13...)

Why you should register your children with Indigenous Services Canada

An update from Dianne Debassige, Memberships Department

ood day M'Chigeeng! This is a call out for parents who may still need to get their chid(ren) registered with Indigenous Services Canada. Please be aware how important this registration is to the

future of your child's health and well be-

ing.

When a child develops into their older life stage, they may require doctors, dentists, teachers, special needs, and/or social and recreational programs. These services/ programs may be limited when you have not registered the birth information to the Registrar's Office.

If you are unsure about filling in the application For Registration on the Indian Registrar, I am here to assist you in completing the forms and mailing them out to the Registrar. Or you can access the form online at www.sac-isc.gc.ca and mail it out independently. Instructions are provided for completing the form and where to mail it.

You will need the Long Form - Statement of Live Birth or the new Birth Certificate



with parents' information on it. This original birth document will be mailed back to the permanent address you give on the application form. Once your application has been processed at the Headquarters Office, a notice will be mailed out to you and M'Chigeeng Membership office. Once the Registry number is assigned in your child's name, funding arrangements can be afforded to your child's needs. Note: The Indian Registry number must be obtained before you can apply for a Certificate of Indian Status or Secure Certificate of Indian Status, better known as status cards.

Let me know when you would like to get started with the paperwork!

Starting the month of December, the shelter will be open on TUESDAYS & WEDNESDAYS from 1pm-4pm. This is only for those two days; to provide services for the community members located in Lakeview and area. I Valisa Peltier the shelter coordinator and Leslie Scott our systems navigator will be there providing outreach services such as a warming centre, come by to warm up have a coffee, hot chocolate, a bit to eat, and one on one peer support If needed. Leslie will be available for other services such as help with resumes, cover letters, food bank supports, and all other inquires. There Is a clothing bank located at the low barrier shelter, for anyone who needs clothing, winter boots,

winter jackets, socks, mitts and hats the Shelter Coordinator will gladly assist with access to the clothing bank during those days.

The clothing bank is operational during the week by appointment only. We have all sizes for male and female. If anyone is in need and would like to access the clothing bank please call the Valisa Peltier at 705-968-0517.

The 'Low barrier Shelter' is located at 44 tikmeg road and is open Thursday-Monday from 1030pm- 830pm. Rides are available from the ' Peer support and outreach' building at 22 Bebonang street from 11pm-12am-2am-4am-6am and with a final drop off at 8am. If you need emergency shelter and need a ride please call the Shelter workers at 705-968-0517 anytime after 10:30pm.

- **2. Succession Planning / Professional Development** The plan is to focus on success planning and development in order to transition roles where staff may be retiring in the near term and within the next five (5) years.
- **3. Human Resources Information System (HRIS)** Continuing the implementation of the HRIS system including Time Management system for employees and utilizing the full capabilities.
- **4. Performance Evaluation and Employee Development Tools** Review technology-based solutions will be explored for performance evaluations and development tools, improving planning and coaching opportunities for employees and managers.

Under the supervision of the Family Resources Supervisor, the Band Representatives will represent all M'Chigeeng First Nation band membership children regardless of location, before the courts or legal matters. The Band Representative will ensure the heritage; cultural traditions, identity and rights of M'Chigeeng First Nation children are preserved by all parties involved in child welfare matters.

Essential Functions:

General

- To ensure all M'Chigeeng First Nation Protocols and Bylaws are adhered to.
- To act as an advocate at all child protection hearings, and to lobby for prevention and intervention solutions to issues directly affecting band membership children.
- · Intake and assessment, obtain informed consent, collect client and family background/ case history, and develop plan of care
- · Works with clients and appropriate workers to assess situations, identify issues and develop safety plans

Case Management/ Administration

- Practice strict confidentiality, privacy, ethical and non-bias approaches
- Prepare, serve, and file court documents such as Answer and Plan of Care, Case, Settlement and Trial Management conference briefs
- · Attends child welfare investigations and visits aiming to prevent/close case files prior entering the court system
- Responds and acts on inquiries and referrals in a timely and professional manner and maintains contact with CAS and other involved social service
 agencies to keep abreast of client cases
- · Attends pre- and post-trial meetings and provides oral and written presentations in court as required

Make The M'Chigeeng First Nation Fire Department's Holiday Wishes come True!

From the M'Chigeeng First Nation Fire Department

hile fire can happen anywhere, at anytime, it most often strikes when we let our guard down - when we're distracted by the hustle and bustle of the holidays, by our cellphones, by the kids or by the doorbell. All it takes is for a pot to be left on the stove, or a candle left burning unattended, and a family's holiday celebrations can turn to tragedy.

The MFNFD encourages everyone to never leave a cooking pot unattended on the stove and consider using battery-operated or electric flameless candles.

Smoking is another leading cause of fires during the holiday season. Make sure smokers extinguish cigarettes in large deep ashtrays – not in plant pots which may contain peat

moss or shredded bark that can easily ignite. Ashes should be emptied in a metal container – not the garbage can – and put outside.

The MFNFD also reminds you to maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home. Install smoke alarms on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. CO alarms are required outside all bedrooms. Test your smoke and CO alarms every month and install new batteries if needed.

Holiday Fire Safety (cont'd from pg 10)

Enjoy a fire-safe holiday season by following these tips:

- Always stay in the kitchen when something is cooking on the stove;
- Place lit candles away from anything that can burn and out of the reach of children and pets where they can't be knocked over. Remember to snuff out candles before leaving the room or going to bed. Consider using battery-operated or electric flameless candles;
- Drink responsibly. Attempting to cook or smoke while under the influence of alcohol is too often a contributing factor in fatal fires;
- Make sure the base of real Christmas trees are immersed in water at all times, to prevent them from getting too dry;
- Check all sets of decorative lights before putting them up and discard any sets that are damaged;
- Develop and practice a home fire escape plan so that everyone in your home knows what to do if the smoke or CO alarms sound.

M'Chigeeng Community Energy Projects 2022/2023

As a First Nation, M'Chigeeng was eligible to apply for funding energy projects under the Indigenous Electricity Systems Operator (IESO). Our Economic Development department applied for three (3) energy related programs and was approved for all three programs.

- Indigenous Energy Project (IEP): Feasibility study & Legal costs for Energy Investment project with Lafarge Canada. Initial work began in the spring of 2022.
- 2. Indigenous Community Energy Plan (ICEP): Funding approved to update current Community Energy Plan.
- Community Energy Coordinator: Funding approved to hire for a three (3) year employment position. Posting is up for applicants.

raditional connectivity may not be available for many small to medium enterprises (SMEs) and will require the purchase or installation of additional or specialized equipment in order to achieve the minimum service level of 25mbps. The Broadband Internet for Remote Areas fund will assist rural and remote small-medium businesses located in Northern Ontario.

- This non-repayable grant opportunity reimburses eligible applicants 50% (up to a maximum of \$1,500.00) towards the purchase of hardware, installation, labour fees and shipping towards upgraded or new broadband or satellite internet.
- New technologies can provide service levels to a minimum of 25mbps download and 5mbps upload, scalable to 50mbps download and 10mbps upload via satellite or fixed wireless solutions.

Eligibility

- · Established businesses operating on a full-time basis, with a valid Canadian BIN number, are eligible
- Established seasonal businesses, such as tourism operations, are also considered eligible.
- Businesses must be within NOHFC/FedNor northern Ontario boundaries
- · Hobby and part-time businesses are not eligible.

To ensure that you are eligible please consult with our staff BEFORE purchasing the equipment. Upon receipt of your application, NEOnet will contact you regarding your eligibility.

Eligible Costs

- Hardware and peripherals
- Installation charges
- Shipping and handling fees

Ongoing costs (monthly service fees) are not eligible.

and nursing services out within the community as well as maintain the Wellness Center facility. The youth Program has continued with the Little Sisters and Young Warriors program as well as offering youth programs withing the community. 


