

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

Hope everyone had a great summer! I have been pretty busy this past year with a Project for the post office since November 2024. Prior to that I was in negotiations, to secure funds with Canada Post on the relocation and upgrade. It has been a huge learning experience understanding the operations of the Canada Post. Thank you all for your patience in this journey and I love seeing this new venue in our community for our members. I'd

like to welcome Michelle Mattatall, Postal Service Clerk, and Janine Corbiere, Postal Lead, to the postal service. If you are interested in working as an on-call employee, please send in your resume.

On another note, we have secured a Lands Coordinator, Angela McEwen. Since our former Lands

Coordinator moved on, I also did some training in lands to continue the service until the position was filled. This year, we will be planning around Environment & Land ensuring more Lands knowl-



edge sharing, partnering with Lakeview School (educational pieces), policy development, procedural Manual and more information meetings on estates. Also, under the Lands, we will be reaching out regularly to ensure that cenotaph is updated, maintained with the communities' help of course. I remember initiatives that were mentioned by some of members like the veteran's flags on the poles, updating names and working on a booklet. We will have this soon, please watch for posting. We also had a program for our members, who were ready to build under the First Nation Housing Fund Program – reimbursement for the surveys. This department also assists band members with Estates matters.

ESTATES

The federal government administers what happens to an estate when someone passes away. However, MFN can assist in making the process less stressful. Estate planning with your loved ones eliminates future disputes, as it provides a clear indication for the distribution property & assets. We can help you with preparing a Will, choosing an Executor, & explain the legal process after death.

What We Can help you do:

- 1. We can assist with your land descriptions for your will and explain the process of estates administration.
- 2. We can assist administrators in the performance of their responsibilities

What Wills Do:

Wills will help your family. Wills will keep peace in your family. A will is your voice, guiding your family on how you want your belongings to be distributed.

My English name is Angela McEwen. I am a member of Batchewana First Nation, Anishinaabe and Lakota Dakota lineage with Arabian ancestry, and hail from Minnesota and Obadjawan. I am the new Lands and Resources Co-ordinator and very excited and Honoured to be working for M'Chigeeng. I grew up in northern Ontario hunting, fishing, foraging, berry picking, gardening, canning, and harvesting. I have been working with our communities, people and organizations for more than 30 years as an environmental scientist, investigative journalist, environmental consultant, project technologist (environmental remediation and due diligence), construction and mitigation inspector, an educator, senior policy analyst (scientific researcher - water) and a volunteer. Over the years I had the Honour to work with youth and children, creating and teaching workshops that combine Traditional Ecological Knowledge, Traditional Teachings, western





science, land-based vales, and environmental

stewardship principles. My Clan and name are carried down through both my Lakota Dakota and Anishinaabe lineage which also include Medicine Men, Traditional Chiefs and Healers. I am very Honoured and Proud to be a Jingle Dress dancer and carry a Woman's hand drum.

Over the coming months I will be organizing events, activities, and gatherings some of which will include land-based workshops, informal gatherings, and community planning sessions. I am very passionate about sharing and incorporating knowledge about the environment, our Teachings, our culture, our beliefs and our traditions. Community Feast in Planning!

We are planning a community feast and hide tanning event in early November. We currently have a beautiful moose hide in a freezer freshly shot and donated by a local hunter. We will be bringing in a person to share Traditional Teachings and instructions on how to build a frame and tan and clean the moose hide and hair. So far this is where we are at in the planning stages:

In early November (date to be determined) a community potluck feast will be held at the complex. The hide tanning will take place in a prospector's tent with a wood stove outside. It will be fairly cold this time of year, and we want to make sure all our members and Elders are warm and comfortable. We will be utilizing the kitchen at the complex to cook, serve and clean up once the feast is done. More than likely the hide tanning will take place for a few days. It will be informal and people can come and go as they like to tan the hide, listen to some teachings or just visit and share stories.

CPPW

Public Works:

Public Works department has had a busy Spring/Summer season with the road grading construction on Crosshill Rd come to a completion. They continue to assist with road maintenance, garbage pick up, water delivery and other public services. Going into the Fall/Winter season, they are looking for tenders on sand and salt, as well as planning a snowplowing schedule to streamline the process. A new snowplow has been ordered to help with this process.

Housing:

Housing continues to be busy with maintenance/repairs on our units. Elders also having some of their requests being completed. Our Maintenance staff have been working hard to complete work on the units. We have also had local contractors in helping with repairs and renovations. We have received several rental applications and discussions are being had as to moving forward with some new builds to accommodate those who have larger families. This large of a project of course falls under the Capital Projects management as well. Many thoughtful layouts as well as designs are being looked at at this time. This project would perhaps see at least ten 3 bedroom units being built. Saswaahns will soon be getting a much needed facelift and renovation. With mobility issues in mind, easier access in and out of the building are being incorporated in the renovations.

Water:

It was a great summer for the new splash pad. The new water staff trainees were able to learn and assist with the up keep of the splash pad. The department was very busy with new water hook-ups and installation of water tanks etc. The continued service that they provide keeping the water plant in operational condition is very much a group effort.

CPPW:

Lakeview Lagoons and the new Solid Waste Transfer site are ongoing and 2 of the larger and much needed projects being looked after by Ryan Corbiere. As well, many other smaller projects are on the go. New Dock planning, Arena repairs, implementing a new plan for the Complex building business sites are currently being looked at. There is private First Nation businesses that are inquiring about the available space.

CrossHill Road Project Completed

CrossHill Road has undergone a major transformation over the past two years, addressing both critical infrastructure needs and long-awaited surface improvements.

History

In 2023, the road was part of a significant undertaking that saw a 4-kilometre water line installed to service more than 35 homes, as well as support future lot and subdivision development. While the water project was a success, it left the road in dire need of repairs, and initial funding fell short of completing the surface restoration.

Solution

In 2024, a funding request was submitted to Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) to support the rehabilitation of CrossHill Road. ISC responded by committing funds over two fiscal years to ensure the project could be completed during the 2024–2025 construction seasons.

In 2024, E. Corbiere and Sons were awarded the tender for ditching, culvert replacement, and graveling, which was completed by August 2025.

In 2025, Beamish Construction was awarded the tender for surface treatment. Their crew applied chip and tar surfacing, finishing the project in August 2025. (Continued on next page)

After a long construction season, the work was completed on August 21, 2025, marking the full rehabilitation of CrossHill Road.

These photos showcase the Beamish crew installing the chip and tar, along with the CPPW truck onsite. This milestone reflects strong collaboration, planning, and investment in the long-term development of our community's infrastructure.



Upgrades to Outdoor Basketball Court For Our Community Use!

- Basketball nets were generously supplied by the Health Department to encourage active living and wellness in the community.
- Poles were donated and installed by Coles Property Development (C.P.D.), providing the sturdy foundation needed for the new nets.
- Back boards were carefully installed by the dedicated team from CPPW/Housing Maintenance Crew, ensuring everything was secured and game-ready.

These upgrades reflect the strength of our community partnerships and the importance of creating safe, fun, and healthy spaces for all ages to enjoy. Whether you're shooting hoops for fun, practice, or friendly competition, we encourage everyone to come out and make the most of this revitalized court!

Education Department Update

Overall, the Education Department has gone through many challenges and successes despite the turnaround in staff. On a positive note, this did not deter student services from being disrupted. Looking at each challenge as a learning opportunity has made the department evaluate and make changes to enhance our service delivery to our community.

The **Binoojinh Gamgoonhs** has a full capacity of staff. On June 20, 2025 there were six graduates. They have now moved on to Full Day Kindergarten Program at Lakeview School. We have a Quality Improvement Program that is happening at the Center focusing on reading. This is to help our young learners develop a strong foundation in reading. We also provide a strong Ojibwe language and culture program led by fluent speakers. It is important for our future leaders to know who they are and where they come from. Binoojinh Gamgoonhs is under the supervision of Denise Debassige and Debbie Ense.

Lakeview School began the school year on a positive note with a full capacity of staff with Roxxanne Corbiere (Mandamin) and Deana Debassige Wood leading the way. A big focus on cultural teachings to go alongside the academic learning has had a positive impact on our students. This past June we saw eighteen students graduate from grade eight. We wish them well as they begin the next educational journey into high school.

Manitoulin Secondary School had the biggest graduating class this year with eighteen of the students from M'Chigeeng. Thirteen of the students began grade nine togethers and were successful in completing their OSSD in four years. Justin Francis is the High School Navigator and makes the students feel as comfortable as can be while guiding them each step of the way.

Post Secondary Education saw twenty-nine graduates from various educational institutions. This 2025-26 academic year we have been able to sponsor 119 students into various programs. Bonnie Beattie is our Post Secondary Navigator.

New Student Transportation Van Supporting Special Needs

In 2022, Lakeview School identified a serious gap in student transportation. Many students with special needs or those enrolled in modified programs were struggling to get to and from school due to the lack of a dedicated vehicle. While Council approved funding that same year, the project unfortunately stalled and no progress was made at that time.

Fast forward to 2025, Janette stepped in and took the reins to make sure this important initiative became a reality. In June of this year, a specialized van was purchased to support these students and their families.

This new vehicle provides a safe, reliable, and consistent transportation option for any child with special needs or modified programming. Parents can now rest assured knowing their children have dependable access to school, reducing stress and removing barriers to education.

The van represents more than just transportation—it's an investment in inclusivity, equity, and the success of every student at Lakeview School.

Kids Summer Day Camp

Held every Monday and Tuesday at the M'Chigeeng Arena and Youth Centre in partnership with Thunderbird Partnership Foundation, the camp offered youth

Guest facilitators also led sessions on hand drumming, leather pouch making, and smoking prevention. On July 28, campers took a trip to Urban Air Trampoline Park in Sudbury, where they enjoyed trampolines, dodgeball, obstacle courses, rock climbing, ziplining, and more.

Youth Camping Trip at Mississaugi Provincial Park

A 3-day youth camping trip was held in partnership with Thunderbird Partnership Foundation and the M'Chigeeng Youth Program. Eight Indigenous youth from Manitoulin Island (including four from M'Chigeeng) participated. Activities included hiking, swimming, outdoor cooking, fire building, painting, and UNO. The trip provided youth with a meaningful outdoor cultural and recreational experience.

Maple Leafs Draw Prize & Youth Centre Drop-In

To wrap up an incentive program that ran from March 24 to July 7, a special drop-in and draw prize event was held. Youth had the opportunity to earn one entry per day of full participation at the Youth Program. The grand prize was a Toronto Maple Leafs team-signed "Black Excellence" hoodie featuring signatures from Auston Matthews, Mitch Marner, John Tavares, Max Pacioretty, Max Domi, Joseph Woll, William Nylander, Matthew Knies, and more. A participant from the M'Chigeeng Youth Volleyball Team won the hoodie.

Welcome Back, Interim Manager

This past spring, Grant Taibossigai returned to the office as Interim Business and Economic Development Manager. Grant brings valuable knowledge from years of service to M'Chigeeng, and his return has brought stability during this transitional time. Until a full-time manager is hired, he will guide the team through ongoing initiatives like renewable energy, the Lafarge partnership, and major community investment projects. His leadership ensures that HIAH Corp stays on track while continuing to grow and adapt to new opportunities .

New Location - Easier Access for Community

In March 2025, HIAH Corp moved into a new office at Unit #1, right beside Freshmart Grocery Store. The move makes HIAH services more visible and accessible for community members. Visitors are encouraged to stop by, meet the team, ask questions, and learn more about current business and economic projects. This location was chosen to place HIAH directly in the heart of the community, making economic development services easier to access for everyone .




Major Projects UnderwayM'Chigeeng & Lafarge Investment Project

Planning continues on an advanced Micro Grid energy system. This project is designed to create both long-term investment returns and new employment opportunities. With early-stage research and development support from Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) and full support from Chief & Council, this 3-year initiative marks one of the largest energy projects for M'Chigeeng.

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations

Research this summer confirmed two sites for new charging stations:



- Business Development Centre to host a Level 3 Fast Charger capable of charging vehicles in about 30 minutes.
- M'Chigeeng Arena to host two Level 2 Chargers for slower, 4–6 hour charging.

These additions will make M'Chigeeng a key stop for EV drivers on Manitoulin Island and reduce emissions locally.

Business & Entertainment Development Centre

Work on a new facility continues, with design plans nearly finalized. The 14,000 sq. ft. space will include retail units, meeting rooms, offices, a kitchen, and a





Centrally located on Manitoulin Island within the Great Lakes Region of Northern Ontario, Canada, the heart of the community is located within the bay surrounded by the North Channel of Lake Huron. The First Nation formerly known as West Bay, proudly changed the name of the community to M'Chigeeng (Pronounced Shi-geeng).

The second largest First Nation on Manitoulin Island was settled in the middle of the 19th century when many Anishinabek from the north shore area relocated. M'Chigeeng is now home to the Anishinabek of the Three Fires Confederacy: Odawa, Ojibway and the Pottawattomi Nations. The total Registered Population of M'Chigeeng First Nation is 2,543 – (Source: INAC)
